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PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

SUCH INTERESTING TIMES.....

A warm welcome to Term 2, to all our students and families. Like you, no doubt, staff are also navigating what we all hope is a once in a lifetime turn of events. We trust that your children are getting used to 'remote learning' and developing a new set of skills to enable their learning to continue.



Thank you to the many parents who have offered feedback about our program. Your thoughts have been, quite understandably, mixed. However, we have been most appreciative of the majority of parents' positivity and overwhelming support for the efforts of staff.

As you would understand, we have focussed very closely on our most Senior Students' program. Our Year 12 students are feeling very concerned (as are their teachers) with the lack of clarity about how the VCE might be modified or how university entrance will be determined. In the meantime we will continue to comprehensively cover all content, in each subject, that we believe will not be changed. We are still waiting for VCAA to release details on the remainder of the year – the briefing that had been scheduled for yesterday (Thursday) was cancelled just prior to the online meeting commenced.

Our Junior School moves, next week, to a new phase in our remote learning program: details are in this Newsletter. There will, undoubtedly, be ongoing refinements of our program. Staff continue to develop their skills in use of technology and that will be reflected in the program over time.

In response to some concerns expressed by some parents, I note that we are aware that some students find the remote learning less engaging than being in 'normal classes'. I am also certain our staff feel that the remote learning program offers them less opportunity to do what they entered the profession for.....personal engagement in the teaching of young people and being able to see the moment a student 'gets' what is being taught. Our teachers are noting that they miss seeing their students face-to-face in a class and it is clear that when we can get back

JUNIOR SCHOOL PRINCIPAL NEWS

Dear Junior School Students, Parents and Guardians,
The purpose of this communication is to inform you of some changes to the remote learning program and to provide you with clarity about the expectations of our students.



These changes will commence from Monday, 27 April. Junior School students will continue to use Compass as they have in the past, however we will begin to incorporate the 'Chat' function of Microsoft Teams (MT) into the teaching and learning program.

HOW COMPASS WILL BE USED:

- Junior School Students' learning will be guided by their timetable on Compass. Each lesson on their timetable will have a lesson plan outlining the work that needs to be completed.
- All resources (worksheets, assignments and handouts) can be accessed in the relevant folder in the 'Resources' tab on Compass.
- Student will be expected to complete and submit a minimum of one Learning Task a week in English, Maths, Science and Humanities.
- For all other subjects students will be expected to complete and submit a minimum of one Learning Task per fortnight.

HOW MICROSOFT TEAMS WILL BE USED:

- Students are expected to attend (be online, using Microsoft Teams) the first lesson of each subject, each week. During this lesson teachers will be available through Microsoft Teams Chat to clarify instructions and respond to questions/support learning.

to normality, there will be many (from both sides of the screens, most probably) who will be very happy.

In the meantime, I remind parents that any supervision of on-site 'remote learning' does not include any teaching (and may not even involve a teacher) and the advice of DE&T / health officials is still that, for reasons directly related to the health of students and staff, students who can work from home MUST work from home.

I can assure parents and students that our staff will continue, as long as this period of crisis remains, to do their best to offer our students a meaningful and engaging program and to continue to look for improvements in our use of technology to deliver this program.

"IS THIS MONDAY A PUBLIC HOLIDAY?"

I have been made aware that there is a mistaken belief that this coming Monday (27 April) is a public holiday in Victoria. Such is not the case. While a couple of other states do offer the day as a public holiday, in Victoria ANZAC Day is commemorated on the day it falls – there is no replacement public holiday when it falls on a weekend.

The upshot is that Monday, 27 April will be a normal 'remote learning' school day for all Norwood students.

PROTOCOLS FOR USE OF VIDEO LINKS IN THE REMOTE LEARNING PROGRAM

Our remote learning program now involves the use of Microsoft Teams for both Junior and Senior School. It is therefore possible for the video facility to be used and that requires some protocols to ensure we observe issues related to privacy.

- At the moment, we will not be using the video function in Junior School 'classes'.
- The video function may be used in Senior School classes, but only with the permission of the teacher and all students have the right to switch off the video and only use the audio. (This also reduces the data usage – particularly important for households with poor internet coverage or where there may be multiple data users at any one time.)
- In some instances, the video function may be used 1:1 by Heads of Year Level, Wellbeing Team members and Educational Support staff.
- Students using video must be in a 'common' area in the house (such as a living room) NOT their bedroom.
- Students using video must dress in an appropriate manner. Staff have been asked to end a meeting for an inappropriately dressed student and ask them to rectify their dress.
- The College will only use Microsoft Teams in our remote program – Zoom will not be used out of concerns regarding its security.

- Students are expected to register their attendance for the first lesson of each subject, each week. Using Microsoft Teams Chat the teacher will post a 'welcome to the class' message. Students should register their attendance by selecting the 'thumbs up' emoji on this post.
- Students are not expected to register their attendance for the other classes scheduled during the week.
- Teachers will also be available to respond to questions via Compass email and Microsoft Teams Chat during school hours throughout the week.

Note: Parents need to continue to register their child's daily attendance via the daily event on Compass.

SENIOR SCHOOL UPDATE

After only two weeks of remote learning we are pleased to report that students are engaging actively with their classes and working hard. Teaching and learning remotely is a new challenge for both teachers and students alike. Using our Compass platform and introducing Microsoft Teams has allowed students to continue to make appropriate progress with their studies. It is understandable that some students will be anxious about assessments.



The Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA) offers the following advice to students:

If you are in Year 12, you will be able to sit your 2020 exams. This will likely happen in December 2020, at the earliest. For those looking to go on to tertiary study in 2021, institutions across the country are committed to ensuring entrance will be open and available.

One of the strengths of the VCE is that it balances your school-based assessment with external exams. This flexibility means that your school can respond to the current challenges in a way that best supports you to achieve your outcomes.

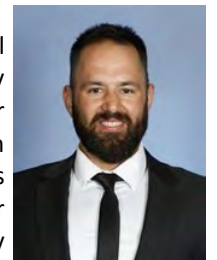
In the meantime, your primary goal during this time is to focus on learning, stay in contact with your teachers and keep on track. Turn to your teachers and family for guidance and support, and your school will provide you with more information as it becomes available.

We also know that the General Achievement Test (GAT) that was scheduled to take place in June will be delayed until October or November. Furthermore, because final year exams will likely take place in December, there will be more time to catch up on assessments when students return to school. Please be assured that our teachers are working hard to ensure our students remain up to date with their studies. We are expecting more detailed information from VCAA in the coming days and will provide further updates as we receive them.

To be **respectful**, in online conduct towards yourselves and each other.

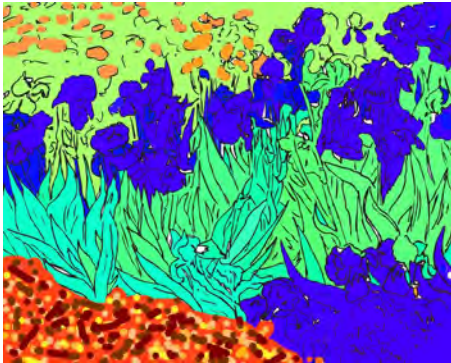
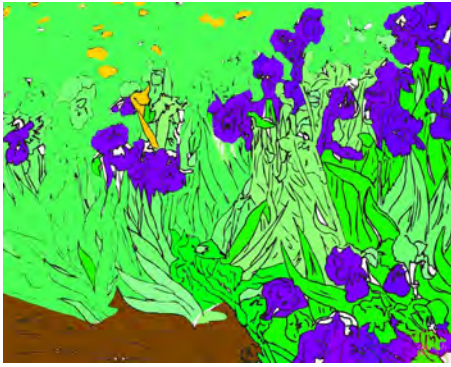
To be **responsible**, and step into the space of independent learning with the guidance of our teachers and leaders.

VAN GOGH'S IRISES TECHNIQUE APPLIED / PAINT.NET

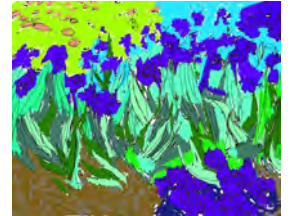
My Year 7 Art classes, studied one of the most famous pieces of art work, "Irises" that was painted by Vincent Van Gogh in 1889. Here, the students analysed his painting.



We were inspired by his 'Flower Gardens', and the way he used nature and the walls around him as inspiration. The students here have displayed various applications, using the 'Art Elements'. The colours explored by the students were from leaf violet - blues, natural ochres, warm greens touched with yellow and orange. Here they showed various characteristics using luminous shapes, size and different tones.

The students applied their skills in using (Paint.net) on their notebooks, to complete their art piece. All students achieved fantastic results on completion.

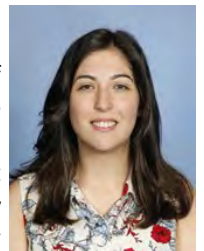

Norwood Secondary College nominated the following young people for their outstanding achievements in 2019:

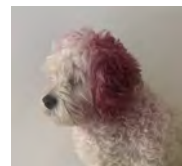

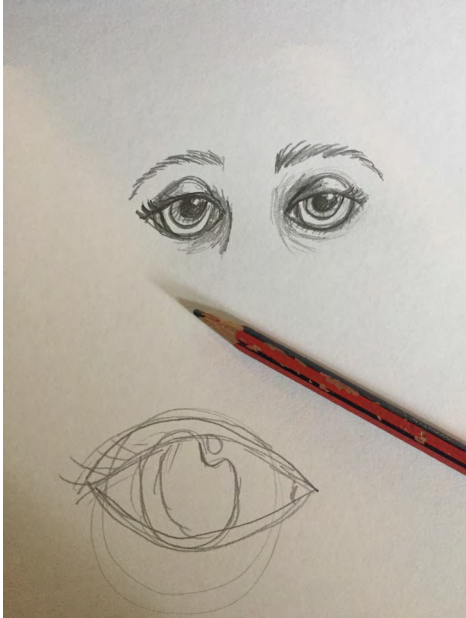
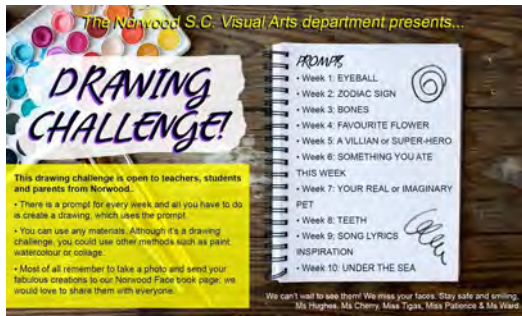

What about Ensembles?

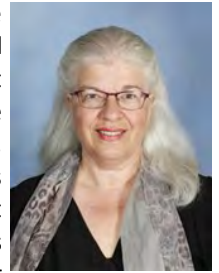

Stay well, stay motivated and get practising for the COVID 19 Talent Show. Remember - submission Due Friday, 9 May. I can not wait to see what you all come up with!



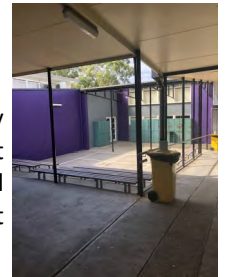
MUSIC NEWS

STUDENT INTERVIEW

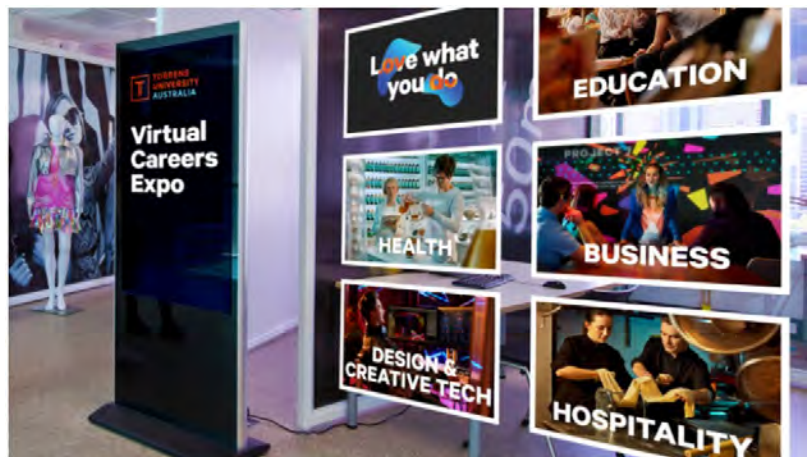
A NEW WAY

CSEF - CAMPS,SPORTS AND EXCURSIONS

CAMPS, SPORTS AND EXCURSIONS FUNDING REMINDER

We encourage all families whose circumstances have changed recently and now hold a valid means tested concession card to apply now. Applications will be accepted until the last day of Term 2.



Parents only need to submit an application form in 2020 if any of these changes have occurred:

- New student enrolments: students who have started or changed schools in 2020, or if the parent DID NOT apply for CSEF at the school in 2019.
- Changed family circumstances: such as a change of custody arrangements, change of name, concession card number, or new siblings commencing at the school in 2020.

USING THE CSEF

You can use the fund for expenses including:

- Year level camps
- School organised sporting programs
- Excursions/incursions
- Specialist electives: Outdoor Education, Advance, VET Sport and Recreation

The CSEF payment cannot be used towards voluntary school charges, books, stationery, school uniforms, Music lessons, etc. Each time you wish to use your CSEF for an event, please print out the excursion form from Compass School Manager and write "pay with CSEF". 
