# **PRINCIPAL'S REPORT**

#### COLLEGE REVIEW

After several postponements, courtesy of COVID, we are aiming to commence our four yearly Review of the College, Week 1, next term. We will be reflecting on our past four years – with significant input from community members, and creating a new Strategic Plan for the coming four years. These Reviews provide an invaluable opportunity for us to seek constructive



feedback on all aspects of the College's functioning. We will then use the feedback to create our goals and directions for the future. The beauty of having an external Reviewer guiding us and two 'Challenge Partners' who are Principals of secondary schools, is that we will have objective, insightful reflections from 'non-insiders' who know schools intimately to help prompt our considerations.

#### YEAR 7 2022

First Round requests for places in Year 7, 2022 are now in and we are already receiving a trickle of second round requests. Interest in Norwood remains very healthy and, sadly, we will not be able to accommodate all who wish to join us next year. We have strictly enforced limits on enrolments and, knowing that most students who commence at Norwood in Year 7 will remain at Norwood for the six years, we have to ensure we do not 'over-enrol' in Year 7 as that would see us pushed over the DE&T enforced cap on overall College enrolments. Consequently, we are working through all applications ensuring that students who live within the enrolment 'zone' are accepted, along with those with siblings currently at Norwood. We then gradually work outwards from the lines demarking our zone to include students who live successively further away from the College until we have reached our enrolment capacity. This meets DE&Ts expectations for fair enrolment practices....there is no room for deviating from that process as all enrolments are checked by Regional personnel.

As I have noted previously, we are very disappointed to not be able to offer places to all who made the decision that Norwood would be the 'best' school for them. We do, however, accept that we are part of a 'system' of local government schools and the DE&T rules are in place to ensure an equitable spread of enrolments between schools.



# A SAFE AND RELAXING BREAK

On behalf of the staff at Norwood, we trust that with the opening of state borders and the capacity of all Victorians to travel within the state and Australia, many of you will be able to enjoy some different vistas and be able to enjoy some renewed freedom. All the best to students and their families – we hope you will find ways to relax and look after yourselves.

Finally, I thank our remarkable staff for the manner in which all have managed another bout of 'remote teaching' and kept their focus on the well-being and academic progress of our students. Take care and we will see you in a couple of weeks.

# VOCATIONAL EDUCATION & TRAINING (VET): NEW GOVERNMENT FUNDING MODEL

In the recent 2021 state budget, the Victorian Government announced that from 2022, new funding will be available to schools to pay for the cost of materials used for VET courses for senior school students undertaking VCE or VCAL. This acknowledges the important contribution that VET makes to our students' learning, senior certificates, and future careers.

Schools will continue to provide for the cost of tuition, and this new funding will assist to also pay for the items used in training and assessment. This means that for VET subjects, you will no longer have to pay for essential learning materials.

It should be noted, however, that parents will still pay for some costs such as uniform requirements or personal protective equipment, that are used and retained by the student.

We are pleased to be able to reduce costs for families and help our students to participate in VET programs. If you have further questions, please contact Paul Duncan or Gretel Schroeder, our Careers Advisors.

The above information is provided on behalf of the Department of Education and Training and has been newly released to schools. We will keep you updated as more detail is provided to us.

We look forward to supporting our students through the course selection process in Term 3. Very soon, updated Handbooks will be available, and families will be informed about key dates for information evenings. At this stage, we are planning for families to attend on-site but our back-up plan will be to run remote sessions, whilst maintaining the same key dates. Heads of Year Level will communicate these shortly.



# SENIOR SCHOOL PRINCIPAL NEWS

# SENIOR SECONDARY CERTIFICATE REFORM

Victoria is transforming the delivery of senior secondary education with the introduction of a single senior secondary certificate that will offer greater access to quality vocational and applied learning pathways for all students. The senior secondary education reforms aim to provide access to education and training that is relevant, engaging and that delivers in-demand skills for the future



world of work, ensuring that students can access education that leads to employment.

Next year students will still be able to enrol in either the Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) or the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE). The following year, in 2023, VCAL students will be enrolled in the new VCE Vocational Specialisation.

The VCE Vocational Specialisation will be recognised internationally, be valued by employers and will build on the strengths of VCAL including:

- flexible timetables that allow students to study at school, TAFE and work
- opportunities to experience real-life workplaces

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- subjects that will build students skills and prepare them for life after school
- greater access to high quality VET learning, either in school, a neighbouring school or a local TAFE.

The new certificates are part of a suite of 38 reforms recommended in the *Review into Vocational* and *Applied Learning Pathways in Senior Secondary Schooling* (the Firth Review) to lift the quality and perception of vocational education and help more students access high-quality applied learning programs.

# WHAT THE REFORM MEANS FOR COURSE SELECTION IN 2022

We are supporting all students in their course selections for 2022 and are providing the following advice and information to students considering a VCAL pathway.

If students are studying VCAL in 2022 they will transfer into the VCE Vocational Specialisation with credit for completed VCAL subjects in 2023. In 2023, students will continue to study Senior VCAL subjects in the new certificate as part of the implementation process. At the end of 2023, these students will be awarded the VCE Vocational Specialisation if they meet the requirements. This approach provides assurance and clarity to current Year 10 students some of whom will be among the first cohort to receive a VCE Vocational Specialisation certificate in 2023.

The following diagram sets out the senior secondary pathways for students commencing the VCE or VCAL in 2022.
