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#### PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

#### **DEALING WITH COVID – NEW STRATEGIES**

The recent change of strategy for Victoria in how we will be dealing with COVID has already and will continue to have a significant impact on school communities. Our much-hoped-for return to face to face teaching has been delayed as new strategies are put in place to deal with the Delta variation of the virus. Perhaps the most significant strategy that has

been 'fast-tracked' is the plan to vaccinate our children. As you would have noted both in the media and (for families with Year 10, 11 or 12 students) in the bulletin that was sent yesterday, the Government is aiming to have every student who is studying a Unit 3 /4 subject (and who will therefore be sitting the GAT on Tuesday, 5 October) commence their vaccination program from next week. The goal for our senior students is for them to be **fully** vaccinated by the commencement of Unit 3/4 exams (Monday, 4 October).

Like you, school staff await the full details of the vaccination program, but bookings will open next Monday (6 September). I encourage all families to familiarise themselves with the details in the Compass newsfeed sent out yesterday (Thursday, 2 September) or the details provided by Jackie Harris in the Senior School news of this *Compass* edition.

In the meantime, our staff are also seeking opportunities to be vaccinated in an effort to help make our school a safer place for our children to return to.

I note, also, that the Government is aiming to provide at least one dose of a vaccine for **all children aged 12 or older**, by the end of the school year.

Please note that it is our understanding that involvement in the vaccine program is being 'strongly encouraged' – not 'mandated'. I understand that there is a range of beliefs about the vaccine but ask that all the expert health advice is considered in any decision-making.



#### SCREENS ON

In a COVID Bulletin to parents and carers a couple of weeks ago, I asked you to encourage your children to switch their cameras on in classes. Staff have also encouraged students to do so and we have been thrilled to find that many students have responded – with some even saying that they really do like to be able to see each other given the current restrictions prevent them catching up personally. Being able to see each other (staff and students) in lessons may seem a 'small thing' but it will help to keep us all more connected at a time when we are unable to be with each other. Thank you to any who helped achieve this outcome....we hope to have increasing numbers of students who switch their screen on.

#### SENIOR SCHOOL NEWS

By now we had hoped to at least have VCE students back in classrooms. Teachers share your disappointment and frustration that we remain in lockdown, teaching and learning remotely. We were encouraged by the announcement that some assessments would be able to be conducted onsite from Monday, 30 August, only to be left disappointed when this translated to one subject area only. We have



been advised that more VCE students will be able to come onsite to complete practical assessments, however, we continue to wait on such advice. Please be assured that we will act on this advice as soon as it is shared with schools.

It has been confirmed that the following will be conducted with health and safety controls in place:

- The General Achievement Test (GAT) has been rescheduled and will take place on Tuesday, 5 October 2021
- Final VCE examinations will take place between Monday, 4 October and Wednesday, 17 November

The Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA) continue to reassure schools that all students will be considered for any disadvantage incurred through COVID circumstances. VCAA will again use the Consideration of Educational Disadvantage (CED) process to finalise VCE results to ensure that every student's circumstances are considered. The CED process accounts for the disruption to student learning caused by the coronavirus pandemic. It applies to every student completing one or more VCE or scored VCE VET Unit 3-4 sequences in 2021, including Year 11 students. It restores a student's results to where they would have been without the disruptions that have occurred throughout the year and makes sure that final VCE results are valid and fair for all students.

Special consideration will also be available for final year VCAL students with each school making a balanced judgment about the level of impact on students and adjusting assessment activities to reflect this.

We are disappointed to announce that our Class of 2021 rescheduled Formal has become impossible to proceed with. We had hoped that changing the venue to our College Hall would increase the likelihood of this being able to happen, however current restrictions have left us with no choice but to cancel the event. Please see the information below, taken directly from a VCAA bulletin provided on 2 September 2021:

- To help support the safe conduct of endof-year exams, the Victorian Government announced a vaccination blitz for final year school students, their teachers and for VCE exam supervisors and assessors.
- The blitz will begin on **Tuesday,7** September and continue until Friday, 17 September. During the blitz, final year students, their teachers and VCE exam supervisors and assessors will have access to priority timeslots to attend their vaccination appointment at a vaccination centre.
- Final year students, their teachers and VCE exam supervisors and assessors will also be able to book their first and second doses via a dedicated appointment booking hotline.
- These additional pathways will help support a faster booking process and minimise absence for students during their schooling hours.
- The Department of Health will release details of the dedicated phone number and session information from Friday, 3 September. Bookings will open on Monday 6 September.
- COVID-19 and Vaccination Your questions answered webinar
- The Victorian Department of Health is hosting a live webinar for final year high school students, their families and educators to provide information on COVID-19 vaccination. You can join the free webinar on Friday, 3 September, 4pm -5pm via this <u>link</u> (no need to register).

Topics covered include:

- Vaccines, development and safety
- Accessing and consenting to a vaccination
- How to book an appointment
- Q+A with the panel
- This event will be held via Microsoft Teams Live. For access information, see <u>here</u>.

We understand that this announcement will be met with great disappointment as this has traditionally been a highly anticipated Year 12 social event. At this stage, we find ourselves faced with circumstances beyond our control. A great deal of planning has gone into this event and we had hoped to have better news to share with you. Please be assured that once our students are back at school, we will look to ensure our Class of 2021 are able to celebrate the end of their schooling, keeping in mind the health and safety parameters that we are faced with.

Recent announcements have focused on prioritising vaccinations for VCE students. We have now received information on how this process will work, please read the side panel for further details.

I would encourage you to attend the webinar via the link and take advantage of the priority vaccination program. We look forward to seeing our students return to school in a staggered process in Term 4. I would like to take this opportunity to thank parents/carers for your ongoing support and patience. Thank you to our staff for their tireless commitment to getting our students through. I would like to also recognise our student leaders for maintaining positivity and connecting with their year level. Finally, a huge, thank you to our students who continue to turn up to remote lessons and do their very best. We are proud of all of you. I would encourage all of you to please turn on your cameras so that we as a community stay as connected as we possibly can.

#### YEAR 10 HISTORY NEWS

#### YEAR 10 HISTORY – JEWISH HOLOCAUST CENTRE INCURSION

Despite the constraints of the current COVID-19 lockdown, the Year 10 History team were excited to be able to offer the opportunity for students to (virtually) visit the Jewish Holocaust Centre. The Jewish Holocaust Centre was created by Melbourne Holocaust survivors as



a memorial to the 6 million Jews who were murdered in WWII. It opened in 1984 with a mission to educate the public to combat antisemitism, racism, and prejudice in the community.

All students studying History in Semester 2 logged on to a 'Zoom' call at 9am on Monday, 30 August 2021. This provided an exciting change of scenery to the normal routine of 'Microsoft Teams'. The Norwood History staff were amazed at the respect and admiration the students demonstrated towards Gilah, our Holocaust survivor. Furthermore, the questions they asked demonstrated their desire to learn from one of modern History's most horrific events.

The Jewish Holocaust Centre sent an e-mail NSC praising the maturity of the Year 10 cohort at Norwood Secondary College:

'Soo and Fanny were both so impressed at the level of engagement from the students and made particular mention of how well-mannered they were.'

Ebi, one of Year 10 History students, offered to talk about what she gained from this experience:

"On Monday, 30 August, the Year 10 history classes were given an amazing opportunity to talk to a Holocaust survivor. It was an interesting, yet devastating, experience. The kind people who ran the webinar described in detail what happened in those horrific years from 1941- 1945, explaining how terribly the Jews were treated, the concentration camps, and the lead up to the final solution. Afterwards, we were introduced to a survivor, Gilah. She explained her personal experience and allowed us to ask her many questions. As a baby when the Holocaust erupted, her parents moved Gilah through an underground movement into a home of seven children, whereby she was the youngest, for safekeeping. Growing up in a rebellious non-Jewish family certainly was not easy. At times, she had to hide from the Germans and the Nazi supporting relatives of the foster family. She was put into a cupboard or sent out into the garden numerous times, learning to be silent. The children of the family also had to make sacrifices to keep her safe by not having friends over and being forbidden to mention her. The family managed to keep her protected until the war was over, and she was able to go back to her biological parents. Although she was very young at the time, it had a tremendous effect on her life and her connection to her biological family.

I believe I am incredibly lucky to be able have this experience and highly appreciate Gilah for sharing her personal story and the women from the Holocaust Museum for hosting this event."

The Year 10 History team would like to thank the JHC, Gilah, Soo, Fanny, and all participating students for ensuring this event was meaningful and successful.

For some of us, extra time at home means a chance to try new recipes, hone in on cooking skills and an opportunity to create masterpieces. Food Technology staff have been encouraging students to do just this over the past few weeks. Here's a snapshot....



The Year 8s were given the challenge of helping to prepare a family meal. The photos indicate the varied

ways students participated and produced delicious items for their families. Home cooking also inspired productions of Scones and Fruit Pastries.

Year 9s have been working on Designer Muffin tasks and discussing the benefits of breakfast and lunches. Their home learning lessons encouraged the production of muffins, breakfast wraps and lunchbox cookies.

Year 10s have learnt the art of Pasta Making with various productions of Carbonara and Ravioli to name a few.

We thank all our wonderful students for sharing their photos with the community and for all their perseverance during this time. The following recipe makes a delicious Focaccia – Maybe you could use the weekend to give it a try (rock salt, oil and rosemary is my favourite flavour).

Focaccia is an Italian, thick pizza-like bread that is flavoured with a variety of toppings such as herbs, spices, salt crystals and Parmesan cheese. The cooked focaccia is served to accompany soup or as a snack, split and filled with ingredients such as ham, cheese, and tomato, and is sometimes toasted or cooked in a sandwich press. It can also be used with dips.

#### INGREDIENTS

1 cup (250ml) warm water 2 tsp dried yeast	<b>Topping</b> 1 tsp. oil 1 tsp. salt	
1 tsp. sugar	<ul> <li>Plus choose from:</li> <li>2 tsp. mixed dried herbs,</li> </ul>	
2 cups bread flour	<ul> <li>Eg. basil, oregano or parsley</li> <li>2 Tbsp. Parmesan cheese</li> </ul>	
1 tsp salt	<ul> <li>2 cloves garlic, chopped</li> <li>2 Tbsp. chopped olives</li> </ul>	
1 Tbsp. olive oil	Sprinkle lemon pepper	

#### **METHOD**

- 1. Preheat oven to 220°C.
- 2. Combine the water, yeast and sugar in a small bowl.
- 3. Line a baking tray and lightly grease the paper with olive oil.
- 4. Sift the flour into a large bowl and stir through the salt.
- 5. Make a well in the centre of the dry ingredients and add oil and combined water, yeast and sugar mixture.
- 6. Mix to a soft dough.
- 7. Turn onto a floured board and knead for 5 minutes.
- 8. Divide the dough in half and roll and shape each into an oval, 2cm thick.
- 9. Place on the baking tray, cover loosely with plastic wrap and prove in a warm place until it increases in size.
- **10.** Make indents in the top every 3-4 cm by pushing down firmly with fingertip. Brush each oval with olive oil and sprinkle with the teaspoon of salt. Sprinkle with additional optional toppings.
- 11. Bake for 15 minutes at 220°C, then reduce oven to 200°C for a further 5 minutes.

Place on a rack to cool.

## COVID-19 update for your school community

The safety of your students and school community is our priority. As health advice evolves, we are committed to keeping your school community updated to ensure your students continue to feel safe and confident when travelling on our services. #### **QR CODES ON OUR BUSES**

The Victorian Government is installing QR check in codes onboard all of our buses. QR codes assist with contact tracing when there is an identified exposure site and helps slow the spread of coronavirus (COVID-19). Please encourage your students to check in every time they see QR codes at stations, platforms and stops as well as on trams, trains and buses. Students who do not have a smartphone can register their myki to assist with contact tracing. You can register a myki online at https://www.ptv. vic.gov.au/tickets/myki/register-your-myki/, via the PTV app or by calling 1800 800 007.

#### NEW RECOMMENDATIONS FOR STUDENTS ON MASKS

All students 12 years and older are still required to wear a fitted face mask on board our services unless they have a medical exemption. The Victorian Chief Health Officer Brett Sutton has now also recommended all children of primary school age wear masks indoors.

#### WE CONTINUE TO OPERATE REGULAR SCHOOL SERVICES

Our regular school services continue to operate for students who cannot learn from home and for children of essential workers. Our services are deep cleaned daily including "high touch areas" such as handrails and posts, grab straps, seat top handles, window ledges and bell presses.
