COVID UPDATE

DET have informed us that a new 'Operations Guide' is coming out very soon. It will detail any changes to our practices that have been approved by government and DET. Most will know that face masks will no longer need to be worn in secondary schools and there will be various other 'tweaks' that our state health advisors have recommended be incorporated into our schools. We will inform families as soon as possible about any changes and look forward to continuing reductions in the level of restrictions.

TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT AROUND THE COLLEGE

We remind parents that, when dropping off and picking up students, drivers must obey the signed parking restrictions. There are areas on Byron Street where cars cannot be parked and other areas where there are time restrictions. Further, it is illegal to park across the driveways of local residences. We ask all parents to ensure they drive and park safely and obey the signs – most importantly, the posted speed limit during school hours. It is important to note that Maroondah Council By-Laws Officers do visit the roads around the school and enforce the parking restrictions.

We have recently been given cause to remind parents of a College rule regarding cars in our grounds. Parents please note that there must be **no dropping off of students in the College grounds**. No family cars are allowed in our grounds at the start or end of the school day to ensure our student pedestrians, who quite rightly walk on the internal roadways, are safe inside the grounds. We trust our community will observe this important safety rule. This includes the lane off Mullum Mullum Road as well as the road in front of the College library.

Please note that when our building construction process commences next month, there will be no access to the lane off Mullum Mullum Road as it will be the access point for construction vehicles, only.

MANAGING BIG, CHALLENGING EMOTIONS

Some of the students in our school community may be dealing with challenging emotions when returning to face-to-face learning - excitement about seeing friends, classmates, and teachers, worry around handling social situations, or concern about the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. Here are some tips that may help to handle those "big" emotions:

- Help your child to get enough sleep, exercise, and healthy food a solid routine is always a good starting point.
- Show a sense of hope and demonstrate resilience. Students often take the lead from behaviours and comments modelled by their parents, and it is important to show that while students may face some hurdles, the concerns will not persist forever. For example, if your child is worried about reconnecting with friends, you could say something like "it could be a bit awkward at first, but you will settle back in."
- Validate their feelings. Try not dismiss their concerns ("there is not anything to worry about" or "that's silly" can be difficult for some students). Instead, reflecting and validating is more helpful – statements like "it's okay if you are feeling nervous about starting back again" are excellent.
- Check-in regularly. This can just be a simple conversation on the way to or from school – using statements like "how was Science today?" is a good, low-pressure starting point.
- Offer emotion regulation strategies such as deep breathing and mindfulness meditation. The Smiling Mind is a free mindfulness meditation app/website with a range of meditations for different age ranges.

Students in Year 7 have finally been able to work together in groups after many months of lockdowns to commence their first group activities in the new STEM centre recently constructed as part of the Norwood College redevelopment plan.



Students pictured are enjoying doing group cooperative team building tasks with hands on activities in order to build effective teams of cooperation and trust.

Year 7 students revelled in the activity and mentioned that although challenging, it was also fun, worthwhile and satisfying. The activities will be used to build effective teams for the next part of their STEM challenge, applying engineering principles to STEM to build and design a flood shelter for an Australian family in a temporary flooded area.

Year 7 students performed their first science experiment in a Senior Science classroom last week. Students were given the task to correctly light a Bunsen Burner, switch from the safety to the working hot flame and to safely, efficiently and with the correct scientific method, measure out a prescribed aliquot of a liquid. They transferred the liquid to a test tube and heated it to boiling point. Afterwards they practiced performing a simple chemical reaction and recording as accurately as possible, as many observations as they could, in a scientific table.

Students enjoyed the responsibility of working with a flame and more importantly, working in a group setting with their peers. As their teacher I was so proud of the way they handled themselves, full of confidence and eagerness to do well and to learn.

SCIENCE NEWS

YEAR 10 BIOCHEMICAL SCIENCE ELECTIVE

Year 10 students are learning about the four main biomolecules: carbohydrates, lipids, proteins and nucleic acids. Whilst studying these molecules, they have made models of DNA and extracted DNA from strawberries. The class have also been learning about ways in which living organisms respond to changes in the environment. To investigate this, they have grown



and transplanted snow peas and observed the germinating seedlings responses to water, gravity and sunlight.

In scientific terminology, they are learning about hydrotropism, geotropism and phototropism. There were some fun hands on activities covered in class over the last 3 weeks and we look forward to doing some

chemistry experiments soon. Fingers crossed our snow peas plants survive.

INSTRUMENTAL MUSIC: HOW PARENT/GUARDIANS CAN HELP

With any new skilled activity, students are at a greater advantage if they form good habits. Regular and productive playing/practise at home is necessary. It is recommended for beginner students to practise for 15 minutes, five times a week. Ways to encourage this are:

- Be interested in their progress and encourage/praise improvements
- Encourage them to perform regularly for family and friends
- Have a regular time and place for them to play
- Ensure that the practise space is secure for them to leave their instrument out, so they can pick it up swiftly if there are a few minutes (whilst waiting for dinner, etc.) to fit in extra practise
- Ensure the instrument is coming home from school for practise
- Ask your child about their music lessons
- Students will initially make some creative sounds! Be encouraging and urge them on, they will get better
- Purchase a Music stand to have at home. It makes playing much easier and develops good posture.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION – COMPASS EVENTS

The process of using 'Camps, Sports, and Excursion Funds' (CSEF), and credits held on your family accounts, has recently changed. The option previously available in Compass to "use CSEF for an event" will be removed due to this new process.



Due to the numerous cancelled camps/events in 2020 and 2021, we hold an amount of funds in credit for certain families that can be used towards camps/events in 2022.

The new process is as follows:-

The NSC General Office will now automatically allocate credits and CSEF towards events where applicable. Please contact the General Office to notify us if you do not want this automatic allocation towards camps/ events to occur for your child/children.

For example:

- An event cost is \$25 and you have a credit or CSEF of \$15, the amount owing for the event will be reduced for your child to \$10, therefore using the credit available to offset the cost of the event
- An event cost is \$25 and you have credit or CSEF greater than \$25, the full amount will be offset against the event and future credits or CSEF will be used in the same way.

Please note that consent **MUST** still be given on Compass for your child to participate in any event.

SCHOOL COUNCIL ELECTIONS - INFORMATION FOR PARENTS

WHAT IS A SCHOOL COUNCIL AND WHAT DOES IT DO?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the key directions of a school within statewide guidelines. In doing this, a school council is able to directly influence the quality of education that the school provides for its students.

WHO IS ON THE SCHOOL COUNCIL?

For most primary school councils, there are three possible categories of membership:

- A mandated elected Parent category more than onethird of the total members must be from this category. Department employees can be Parent members at their child's school as long as they are not engaged in work at the school.
- A mandated elected school employee category members of this category may make up no more than one-third of the total membership of school council. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- An optional community member category members are coopted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experiences. Department employees are not eligible to be community members.

A small number of school councils have Nominee members.

For all schools with a Year 7 and above cohort, there is an additional category of membership:

A mandated elected student member category, with two positions.

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

WHY IS PARENT MEMBERSHIP SO IMPORTANT?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills that can help shape the direction of the school.

Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

DO I NEED SPECIAL EXPERIENCE TO BE ON SCHOOL COUNCIL?

Each member brings their own valuable life skills and knowledge to the role. Councilors may need to develop skills and acquire knowledge in areas that are unfamiliar to them. What you do need is an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

HOW CAN YOU BECOME INVOLVED?

The most obvious way is to vote in the elections, which are held in Term one each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant.

In view of this, you might consider

- standing for election as a member of the school council
- encouraging another person to stand for election.

WHAT DO YOU NEED TO DO TO STAND FOR ELECTION?

The principal will issue a Notice of Election and Call for Nominations following the commencement of Term one each year. All school council elections must be completed by the end of March unless the usual time line has been varied by the Minister.

If you decide to stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or you can nominate yourself in the Parent category.

Department employees whose child is enrolled in a school in which they are not engaged in work are eligible to nominate for parent membership of the school council at that school.

Once the nomination form is completed, return it to the principal within the time stated on the Notice of Election.

You will receive a Nomination Form Receipt in the mail following the receipt of your completed nomination.

Generally, if there are more nominations received than there are vacancies on council, a ballot will be conducted during the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

REMEMBER

- Ask at the school for help if you would like to stand for election and are not sure what to do
- Consider standing for election to council this year
- · Be sure to vote in the elections.
