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COLLEGE PRINCIPAL REPORT

WELCOME BACK TO TERM 2

I trust that families had some time to relax together over the school break. Easter gives many family members some time off work and we were blessed with some beautiful weather if we chose to get out and about. This term is a relatively short one (9 weeks with a couple of public holidays and two days on which students are not to attend school – see Jackie Harris's report on page 3) and staff are very conscious that

with exams at the end of term and the completion of Unit 1 and Unit 3 courses in Year 11 and 12 respectively, there is a need to plunge straight back into coursework. Parent encouragement for our senior students to maintain their study focus and not drop off the pace set in class, will be greatly appreciated.

One of the great joys of the lifting of many of the restrictions on activities is that the College is now able to run events that are important to our culture. In the past two weeks we have been able to hold Anzac Assemblies for the Senior and Junior Schools and an Open Night for prospective students and parents for the 2023 Year 7 intake.

ANZAC ASSEMBLIES

With the softening of guidelines for groups of students being able to gather in spaces in the latest Operations Guide from DE&T, we were able to hold ANZAC Assemblies for Senior then Junior Schools in the Gymnasium. The Gym can hold over 1000 people seated so with appropriate spacing being observed we were able to run our formal ANZAC commemoration, as in past years.

We were fortunate, again, to have a member of the Australian Defence Forces to participate in the events. Flight Lieutenant David Fraser (from the Royal Australian Air Force) led the formal components of our Assembly and gave the address to each Assembly. FLT LT Fraser was very engaging with what he spoke of. He ensured there was no glorification of armed conflict but spoke of the manner in which Australian and New Zealand soldiers dealt with the disastrous Gallipoli campaign. He noted the resilience and ingenuity of the soldiers and how important the culture of 'mateship' was (and still is) in the defence forces. He also spoke of the roles for the defence forces in a modern world – briefly



mentioning the current conflict in Ukraine. He also spoke of his involvement in the RAAF - starting in the Reserve after 20 years in the workforce and choosing to become a full-time officer 6 years later. FLT LT Fraser works in Joint Logistics Command at Victoria Barracks in St Kilda Road, in town, and he has moved quite significantly in terms of vocation from his early days as a graduate of Applied Sciences to assisting the Defence Force involvement in Bushfire Assist, Flood Assist, Ukraine Assist and more. It was, aside from his contribution to the ANZAC Assembly, a fascinating story of career progression in a context where most of our current students could change jobs on multiple occasions through their

Particular mention needs to be made of the contribution of several students.

Winners of the 'Spirit of the ANZAC Prize' in 2021 (Mia Brice and Layla Kiefte) spoke of their prize-winning creations – the applause they received reflected the understanding of our students of how significant their work

College Captains, Caitlin Weatherburn and Evan Barjac and Vice-Captain Grace Jenkin were involved in both Assemblies and led the program and presented very capably.

Thank you, also, to SRC Prefect Rica Poole, College Vice-Captain Grace Jenkin and College Captain Caitlin Weatherburn who represented Norwood SC at the Ringwood RSL Dawn Service on ANZAC Day. Their presence on a public holiday and so early in the morning, along with Year 12 Level Coordinator Mel Cherry, was very much appreciated.

OPEN NIGHT

Open Night for prospective 2023 Year 7 enrolments was held this week. It has always been an event that complements our small group Tours but provides an opportunity for parents and Grade 6 students to hear from class teachers about various subjects and course, speak with teachers and students. This year we felt we could not run our classroom activities with the numbers of visitors we usually get. We were conscious of the need to run a COVID-safe evening, so after our formal presentations from students and senior staff, we introduced our staff Leadership Team and key program managers and invited those present to remain behind to ask any questions that they had.

Many did choose to speak with individual staff and we felt that the alternative was welcomed by our visitors.

We will continue to run Tours for another week, after which families must submit their secondary school preferences to their primary schools and, once the primary schools and DE&T have processed them, we will be informed who has requested a placement at Norwood from 2023.

SENIOR SCHOOL NEWS

ADVANCE NOTICE TO FAMILIES

Please be aware that Friday, 17 June is a Correction and Report Writing Day, therefore it is one of the annual designated Pupil Free Days. Additionally, families need to be aware of another day this term that will be considered a Professional Practice Day for teachers on Friday, 27 May.



Each teacher is entitled to one day per term (four days per year) release from their scheduled duties, including teaching, to focus on the improved delivery of high quality teaching and learning. These days are in addition to existing Pupil Free Days and pro-rata for a teacher employed part-time. Usually, Professional Practice Days occur throughout the term and classes for a small number of teachers are covered by replacement teachers.

With the COVID staffing challenges that schools are currently experiencing, the Department of Education & Training has recommended that all State Schools hold their first Professional Practice Day on the same day for all staff in Term 2 to minimise disruption to classes throughout the term. After consideration of the academic and Co-curricular program, the Norwood Professional Practice Day will be Friday, 27 May.

Please make arrangements for both Friday, 27 May and Friday, 17 June as days where students will not be in attendance at school. Thank you for your support of our teachers and the professional work that they do to support our students.

OUR ANZAC ASSEMBLIES WERE AMAZING

Our first day back in Term 2 began with two commemorative assemblies to give thanks and to show our respect for the ANZAC tradition of our country. At these assemblies we remember 25 April as the anniversary of the first major military action in 1915 fought by the Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War.



At these assemblies, alongside a representative from the Australian Defence Force, we pause to reflect on its meaning for each and every one of us. We also acknowledge and recognise the contributions of more than 1000 Indigenous Australians, who willingly enrolled out of a strong sense of patriotism and duty, although they were exempt from Military Service. We remember the spirit, tradition, courage, endurance and sacrifice of the ANZACs.

As a College, we are immensely proud of our students for leading these assemblies, particularly our College Captains for their Address and reading of the poem, 'In Flanders Fields'. YEAR 9 GEOGRAPHY YARRA RANGES FIELDWORK

Earlier this term, four Geography classes undertook fieldwork in the Yarra Ranges. The classes, 9A, 9C, 9E and 9G travelled to Warburton, the Redwoods Forest and the Rainforest Gallery. Students were required to look at the use and management of the Redwoods Forest and Rainforest Gallery and make suggestions for improvements to the sites. The best liked site was Redwoods Forest with students enjoying the calm and relaxing atmosphere of the giant Californian redwoods.



Warburton was also a great place to have lunch with friends with the bakery being a big hit. The weather for the two days was great and overall the feedback was very positive. The students worked hard on their fieldwork booklet and are to be commended for their excellent attitude. Also, a big thank you to Mr Jono Flack and Mr Adam Given for helping out with the excursion.

YEAR 9 PALM OIL TASTE TEST

In Year 9 Geography, students in 9A, 9C, 9E and 9G have been investigating the impact of palm oil on rainforest biomes, particularly in South East Asia. At the end of Term 1, students in the four classes conducted a taste test of products containing palm oil and products which were palm oil free. Students were asked to rate the taste, texture, smell, and appearance of each product. While there was debate about whether the Cadbury or Whitakers chocolate tasted better, students (and teachers) overwhelmingly preferred Nutella (palm oil) to Nuttvia (palm oil free).

SCIENCE NEWS

YEAR 10 BIOCHEMICAL SCIENCE - HOW MUCH BASE IS IN HOUSEHOLD CLEANERS?

Year 10 Biochemical Science students have been introduced to reactions of acids and bases and titration experiment, together with stoichiometry. They performed a volumetric analysis between an acid and a common household cleaner which is a base (Nifti and Homebrand) to determine which brand contained more base.



Students were able to use a concept known as "stoichiometry" to calculate concentrations of how much base was present in Nifti and Homebrand. Introducing students to this concept earlier on is fundamental to Chemistry. Students had spent a few lessons prior to the investigation, designing their experiment and writing out a methodology for their experiment.

I am really proud of the patience all the students showed whilst trying to get the right colour change to indicate that end point had been established. The data they have collected from the investigation will allow them to perform the necessary calculations and determine if it is worthwhile paying more for Nifti rather than Homebrand.

Students learnt some really good skills during the investigation which they will be able to apply to other sciences.

TERM 4, 2022 3 October to 20 December 2022 **IMPORTANT INFORMATION – COMPASS EVENTS** The process of using 'Camps, Sports, and Excursion Funds' (CSEF), and credits held on your family accounts, has recently changed. The option previously available in Compass to "use CSEF for an event" will be removed due to this new process. Due to the numerous cancelled camps/events in 2020 and 2021, we hold an amount of funds in credit for certain families that can be used towards camps/events in 2022.



The new process is as follows:-

The NSC General Office will now automatically allocate credits and CSEF towards events where applicable. Please contact the General Office to notify us if you do not want this automatic allocation towards camps/ events to occur for your child/children.

For example:

- An event cost is \$25 and you have a credit or CSEF of \$15, the amount owing for the event will be reduced for your child to \$10, therefore using the credit available to offset the cost of the event
- An event cost is \$25 and you have credit or CSEF greater than \$25, the full amount will be offset against the event and future credits or CSEF will be used in the same way.

Please note that consent **MUST** still be given on Compass for your child to participate in any event. If you have any questions about this new process, or have a credit and would prefer a refund directly into your bank account, please contact Ms Megha Malhotra, Assistant Business Manager, on 9871 0400.
