

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COLLEGE PRINCIPAL REPORT

ATTENTION SPANS AMONGST OUR YOUNG

An interesting article in the latest 'Education Review' offers thoughts on some of the effects of our increasing use of technology — particularly the use of social media platforms. Studies in England have indicated that a typical student's attention span has been dropping in the past decade — perhaps to as low as 10-15 minutes. (I was actually quite shocked at this figure!)



However, reflecting on social media such as Tik Tok, it is perhaps not surprising that a medium that may only demand a few seconds of engagement can deplete a young person's capacity to maintain focus on tasks requiring more sustained concentration. Reading a newspaper or an English text may prove to be a substantial challenge to young people who are more accustomed to rapid processing of short 'chunks' of entertaining images.

An additional hurdle to focussing on a task is the distraction created by the sounds of messages arriving on a phone. Even if a student turns off their phone when focussing on study, there can be a continuing distraction to their brains as they have become tuned into 'expecting' interruptions from their phones.

Yet technology has become an integral (and highly beneficial) part of education. It has a powerful and positive effect on how teachers deliver, and students receive, our educational programs.

So it is critical that we (schools and families) find ways to balance the positives and negatives.

Using a variety of teaching strategies in schools; a break from using technology by turning off devices and doing something physical, when at home; 're-training' one's brain to persevere in extended reading (start small and build up 'reading resilience'); stand and stretch during classes at school and homework time — even better if coupled with a few deep breaths; reward any gains in persistence in study with an enjoyable activity. All these are strategies that can assist all students (and adults) to overcome the documented negative impacts of our digital devices. These








STEM NEWS
