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COLLEGE PRINCIPAL REPORT

VAPING – A SIGNIFICANT HEALTH CONCERN

This week, there have been reports in major news mediums about primary and secondary age students experimenting with vaping. Worse, it appears that many school age children are regularly using 'vapes'. Whilst this is becoming more prevalent in school grounds, it is certainly not only a problem for schools, but also for families and communities.



As I have written previously, it is illegal to provide or sell e-cigarettes (vapes) to under 18s. This includes parents who purchase on behalf of children and then give them to their children. Yet, we have also become aware, from conversations with our local schools, that some students are bringing e-cigarettes to school and using them on the school grounds – sometimes sharing them with other students.

There are several issues associated with this new phenomenon. It has been quite a few years since schools had to deal with smoking of cigarettes in their grounds. We felt, with the clarity of the dangers associated with the health of smokers and the strategies used to dissuade smokers from smoking (including the graphic pictures and warnings on cigarette packs and the significant taxes on cigarettes) that society had mostly won the 'battle' against smoking. It has been rare that we have had to deal with the use of cigarettes at Norwood in the past few years.

Sadly, vaping has seen a resurgence in 'experimenters'. It appears that these usually unlabelled e-cigarettes have high levels of nicotine (amongst many other chemicals). Regular use can lead to a level of addiction or dependency and some of our young *are* apparently developing a level of addiction to them. Worse, there are increasing incidents of the use of e-cigarettes causing vomiting, burns and poisoning.

Recently released data suggests that school toilets and outside areas at the perimeter of school grounds are common locations for using vapes. Consequently, and because we don't believe that Norwood will be immune to this phenomenon, we have asked our staff to ensure they are vigilant around these locations when on duty and senior staff are


and VCE. If you were unable to attend the online sessions, the presentations have been sent to families via Newsfeeds.

PARENT STUDENT TEACHER CONFERENCES

Parent Student Teacher Conferences will take place from 11am – 6pm, Thursday, 25 August 2022. Unfortunately, due to the increased number of COVID cases we have made the decision that the upcoming Conferences will only be conducted virtually, using the Microsoft Teams platform.



The Conferences provide a great opportunity to meet your child's teachers and discuss their progress to date. We strongly encourage students to attend online with their parents/carers, as we believe there is great value in the students being a part of the conversation.

Bookings: Year 11 - 12 students from 9am on Thursday, 11 August. Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 students from 9am on Friday, 12 August.

Bookings will close for all students at 12noon, Wednesday on 24 August. Although the Conferences will be conducted using Microsoft Teams, the booking process will remain the same as previous years using Compass. Please contact the General Office if you require assistance making bookings. (Instructions on how to access the conference bookings you have made will be published on Compass Newsfeed in the coming week.)

The conference booking duration will be 10 minutes. The 10 minutes will allow you to have a 6-7min discussion about your child's application and academic results and then prepare for the next conference. If you are unable to make a booking with a teacher, you are welcome to email the teacher via Compass to request feedback on your child's progress and the teacher will endeavour to respond as soon as possible.

NSC DEDICATED BUSES

Norwood SC is fortunate to have two dedicated school buses. Recently a Public Transport Victoria representative raised two concerns with the College:

YEAR 8 NEWS




We will be calculating what we have raised in the coming days. A HUGE congratulations to all students who have been involved. This was a team effort by many of our Year 8 students.

SCIENCE NEWS

YEAR 12 CHEMISTRY – WHEN STUDENTS BECOME TEACHERS

The Year 12 Chemistry class is learning about how titrations can be used to determine concentrations of unknown solutions. They were introduced to this concept at Year 11 however, at Year 12 they perform a more in-depth analysis.

The following students - Aramis R, Sean M, Ambransh G and Roderick N volunteered to do the demonstration for the class and teach their peers the skills required to perform a volumetric analysis. Not only did they go through all the steps accurately, their calculated concentrations were very close to the theoretical value.

I am very proud of the students and how they conducted themselves in front of their peers as they took on a teaching role during that lesson.

YEAR 10 BIOCHEMICAL SCIENCE - IT'S ALL ABOUT THE DNA

The Year 10 Biochemical Science classes are learning about the differences between DNA and RNA. To help consolidate their understanding of the structure of DNA, they created DNA models using liquorice and gummy bears. It was a simple activity but it helped visualise the structures.







YEAR 8 ENRICHMENT PROGRAM SCIENCE CLASS


Students from the Year 8 EP class have been undertaking advanced studies into energy transformations and the Law of Conservation of Energy.

Students pictured are conducting a fair test of their own experimental design. Students are determining the percent energy efficiency of insulating and conductive

materials with respect to heat transfer. Students were required to design their investigation and prepare an Extended Practical Investigation of their fair test.
