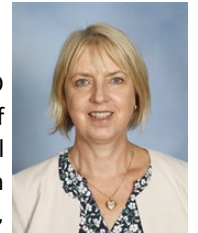

SENIOR SCHOOL PRINCIPAL NEWS

COVID-19 UPDATE: ISOLATION REQUIREMENTS HAVE CHANGED

Any student or staff member who tests positive to COVID-19 must now isolate for a minimum of 5 days instead of 7. If they are asymptomatic, they may return to school on day 6. If they are symptomatic, they must remain in isolation until day 7. If they have symptoms after 7 days, they are strongly advised to stay home until their symptoms have resolved.



As an additional risk mitigation, the Department of Health strongly recommends that those leaving isolation wear a face mask when away from home, both indoors and outdoors, and when they cannot physically distance. Those leaving isolation on day 6 should wear a mask for 5 days but particularly the first 2 days. Those leaving isolation on day 7 should wear a mask for 4 days but particularly the first 2 days.

Those leaving isolation should consider taking a rapid antigen test before attending school.

RAPID ANTIGEN TESTS (RATS) DISTRIBUTION

Throughout Term 4, RATs will be available for student collection on request, from the Junior and Senior Sub-School offices. Students with symptoms who require RATs will be able to access these as needed. Due to the decline in COVID numbers, we will be discontinuing the whole school distribution of these tests. The exception to this is that Year 12 students will receive another pack in the first week of Term 4.

Please be assured that we still have sufficient stock of RATs to provide to students as needed.

HIGH ABILITY PROGRAM NEWS

VICTORIAN HIGH ABILITY PROGRAM, TERM 3

During Term a number of Year 7 and Year 8 students participated weekly in the Victorian High Ability Program undertaking Secondary English or Secondary Mathematics.

In the Secondary English course students explored challenging concepts, characterisation and visual images to find deep meaning. They made comparisons between historical events and contemporary world problems. Following an analysis of key texts that explore dystopias – including “Hive” by AJ Betts – the students created their own dystopian world.

Students also focused on the hope evident in dystopian narratives and their own dystopian worlds. Students provided meaningful feedback to support each other at the drafting stage, prior to the finalisation of their final written piece. Throughout the program, students were supported to participate in an exemplary online English classroom.

During the Mathematics program students were challenged to communicate their mathematical reasoning ‘Beyond All Doubt’ when explaining their findings and had the opportunity to apply this to the Three Digit Algorithm, patterns within the Fibonacci sequence, strategy in games and other interesting mathematical results. Students had the opportunity to evaluate their own progress on a practical problem using graph theory. Mathematical horizons were broadened through the examination of infinity, repeating patterns and paradoxes.

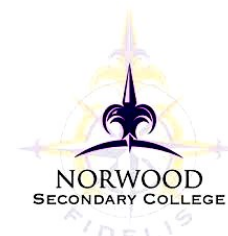


Though these holidays are not traditional holidays for Year 12s, today was a great send off into the beginning of our exam preparations before our final assembly next term.

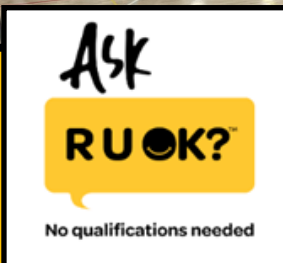

SCIENCE NEWS

YEAR 10 BIOCHEMICAL SCIENCE

Year 10 Biochemical Science students are learning about the processes of photosynthesis (plants making food) and cellular respiration (releasing energy from food). These two chemical processes are vital for life and demonstrates how both plants and animals are so heavily dependent on each other.



Students performed an experiment to observe the two processes occurring in pond weed, Elodea.

They got some good data which they used to complete a practical report. Thank you Ms Emma Day for putting together this practical activity for the students.

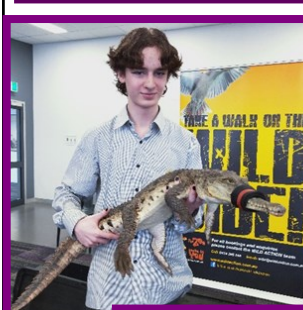
YEAR 10 BIOLOGICAL PSYCHOLOGY INCURSION

This semester we again welcomed special guests in class, Emily, a zoologist and marine biologist from Wild Action in the Macedon Ranges came to present interesting adaptations and reproductive strategies for a range of Australian native animals. The students got to see some special features of different animals up close, and even got to hold crocodiles, diamond pythons, possums, frogs and turtles! This incursion was organised by Ms Nejad for the Year 10 Biological Psychology elective.

It was a fun session to have the zoo come to the classroom, students and teachers alike enjoyed the experience.

Emily, the presenter, mentioned that Norwood students were the only students in the world who were able to pat the endangered pygmy possum in a school setting.

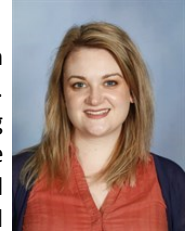

LITERATURE NEWS

YEAR 11 LITERATURE

This term, Year 11 Literature students have been engaging with the conventions of ancient Greek theatre. They explored the structure of tragic plays using Sophocles' "Antigone" before applying their knowledge creatively and writing their own scripts. Students selected Greek mythological narratives, and wrote for a traditional audience after researching ancient Athenian society and values.



Throughout the term, students engaged in writing and editing workshops, learning to peer review their classmates work and apply constructive feedback to their own writing. They further explored traditional elements of Greek theatre by creating masks for their play's protagonist (traditionally worn by actors as they convey exaggerated emotion and status for the character they represent).

After submitting their completed plays, students celebrated with a modern Festival of Dionysus (a traditional fifth century theatre festival) by sharing their masks and delivering dramatic readings from their plays to the class. Like the traditional Festival of Dionysus, students voted for their favourite entries. The winner of the best play was awarded with a traditional Ivy Wreath, and a less traditional box of chocolates!

TICKETING & SEATING INFORMATION:

Ticket sales will close on Wednesday, 5 October. No further tickets will be available to purchase after this date.

The cost for the evening is **\$97.50 per person** and seating allocation is intended for a **family group of three** (typically the Year 12 student and two close relatives) with the exception of families with twins, where four seats will be allocated for purchasing.

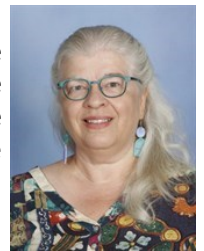


MUSIC NEWS
