SENIOR GIRLS' CRICKET: DIVISION PREMIERS 2023
Norwood 2/127 off 15 d Ringwood 1/75 off 15.

As in 2022, the third Thursday of Term 1 was set aside for the Division Competition and once again our Grand Final was played at Silcock Reserve in the searing heat against our formidable opponent, Ringwood.



The customary T20 format was reduced to 15 overs after the Osborn family generously delivered (in addition to extremely well received icy poles) their family broom with which to sweep the 'fertilised' pitch. Thanks so much Kate and family for all your dedication to the girls over the last 6 years.

Winning the coin toss, Ringwood's Rosie decided that she and Rory would take up the attack with the shining 142g Kookaburra. Captain Lily O and co vice-captain Helena A opened the batting with intent. 25 runs were quickly on the board, before Lily in the third over, attempting to crack one over the bowler's head all the way to the boys' oval, was bowled for 10 by a well-constructed delivery. Joining Helena, co vice-captain Ella R confidently clipped her first ball faced for 2, but unfortunately the next and last ball of over 3 saw her inside edge disturb the off stump. At 2/27 off 3, co vice-captain Maddie C marched to the pitch and straight away displayed her timing, hitting 4 fours in her first 7 scores.

During the valuable partnership of Helena and Maddie that ensued, exactly 100 runs had been added to our score, as we closed the innings on 2/127. Helena's 38* combined with her 48* last year and 51* in 2020 totals 137 runs without being dismissed against Ringwood Seniors: most impressive indeed! Maddie just pipped Helena, top scoring with 39*, which co-incidentally was a replica of her 39* in the same game last year!

After only a brief respite from the soaring temperature, Lily and India C bowled 2 tight overs each, which set the scene for another 7 bowlers to enjoy an over or two. Lily captured the wicket of one of their openers, sending the middle stump flying, whilst India's second over was commendably the only maiden over of the day, for either side. Heidi C, Summer D, Helena and Maddie Coia all contributed with 2 solid overs each; Niki D, Chiara G and Alana W each with one. It is pleasing to note that our 3 youngest bowlers, India, Niki and Chiara all displayed their accuracy with zero no balls and zero wides! Maddy C, Issy A, Mia B and Taya F all displayed determination in the field, with Mia's concentration at backward square leg most valuable in limiting boundaries. A special mention must also be given to the faultless display of our versatile wicketkeeper Ella, who did not let any ball pass her!

A big thank you to Ms Smith for accompanying and assisting the team, and to previous Norwood State Champion in cricket and football, Emma B, for her enthusiastic encouragement through the day. And of course, CONGRATULATIONS to all of the squad!

We look forward to the Region competition which is on Thursday, 9 March against the premiers from the Whitehorse and Waverly Divisions.

YEAR 10 BIOCHEMICAL SCIENCE

IMPORTANT INFORMATION – COMPASS EVENTS

The process of using 'Camps, Sports, and Excursion Funds' (CSEF), and credits held on your family accounts, has recently changed. The option previously available in Compass to "use CSEF for an event" will be removed due to this new process.

The new process is as follows:-

The NSC General Office will now automatically allocate credits and CSEF towards events where applicable. Please contact the General Office to notify us if you do not want this automatic allocation towards camps/ events to occur for your child/children.

For example:

- An event cost is \$25 and you have a credit or CSEF of \$15, the amount owing for the event will be reduced for your child to \$10, therefore using the credit available to offset the cost of the event
- An event cost is \$25 and you have credit or CSEF greater than \$25, the full amount will be offset against the event and future credits or CSEF will be used in the same way.

Please note that consent **MUST** still be given on Compass for your child to participate in any event.

Appendix A

Fact sheet 1: school council elections - information for parents

What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the broad direction of a school, in accordance with Ministerial Order 1280 Constitution of Government School Councils, and the Education and Training Reform Act 2006. In doing this, a school council may directly influence the quality of education for students.

Who is on the school council?

For most primary school councils, there are several possible categories of membership:

A mandated elected parent member category – more than one-third of the total members must be from this category. Department employees can be parent members at their child's school providing that they are not engaged in work at the school.

A mandated elected school employee member category – members of this category make up no more than one-third of membership. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.

An optional community member category – members are co-opted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experience. Department employees are not eligible to be community members.

A small number of school councils have **nominee members**.

For all schools with a Year 7 and above cohort, there is an additional category of membership:

A mandated elected student member category, two positions.

Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

Why is parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills and a range of experiences and knowledge that can help inform and shape the direction of the school.

Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

Do I need special experience to be on school council?

Each member brings their own valuable skills and knowledge to the role, however, in order to successfully perform their duties, councillors may need to gain some new skills and knowledge.

It is important to have an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.

Code of conduct for school councillors

School councils in Victoria are public entities as defined by the Public Administration Act 2004.

School councillors must comply with the Code of Conduct for Directors of Victorian Public Entities issued by the Victorian Public Sector Commission. The Code of Conduct is based on the Victorian public sector values and requires councillors to:

- **act with honesty and integrity** be truthful, open and clear about their motives and declare any real, potential or perceived conflict of interest and duty
- act in good faith in the best interests of the school work cooperatively with other councillors and the school community, be reasonable, and make all decisions with the best interests of students foremost in their minds
- **act fairly and impartially** consider all relevant facts of an issue before making a decision, seek to have a balanced view, never give special treatment to a person or group and never act from self-interest
- **use information appropriately** respect confidentiality and use information for the purpose for which it was made available

exercise due care, diligence and skill – accept responsibility for decisions and do what is best for the school **use the position appropriately** – not use the position as a councillor to gain an advantage

act in a financially responsible manner – observe all the above principles when making financial decisions

comply with relevant legislation and policies – know what legislation and policies are relevant for which decisions and obey the law

demonstrate leadership and stewardship – set a good example, encourage a culture of accountability, manage risks effectively, exercise care and responsibility to keep the school strong and sustainable.

Indemnity for school council members

School councillors are indemnified against any liability in respect of any loss or damage suffered by the council or any other person in respect of anything necessarily or reasonably done, or omitted to be done by the councillor in good faith in:

the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a councillor, or

the reasonable belief that the act or omission was in the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a council.

In other words, school councillors are not legally liable for any loss or damage suffered by council or others as a result of reasonable actions taken in good faith.

How can you become involved?

By participating in, and voting in the school council elections, which are held in Term 1 each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant.

In view of this, you might consider:

standing for election as a member of the school council encouraging another person to stand for election.

What do you need to do to stand for election?

The principal will issue a Notice of Election and Call for nominations in Term 1 of each year. Council elections must be completed by 31 March, unless varied by the Minister for Education.

If you stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or, you can nominate yourself in the parent member category. You can only be nominated by another member of the same electorate that you are eligible for (e.g. a member of the parent electorate may only nominate another parent of that electorate)

Department employees with a child enrolled at a school where they are not engaged in work, are eligible to nominate for parent membership at that school.

Return your completed nomination form to the principal within the time stated on the Notice of Election. You will receive a Nomination Form Receipt via post, email or by hand delivery.

Generally, if there are more nominations than vacancies a ballot will be conducted in the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

Remember

Consider standing for election to school council.

Ask the principal for instructions if you are not sure what to do.

Be sure to vote if the election goes to ballot.

Contact the principal if you are unsure about what is required at any stage of the election process.
