GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA) REPORTS

GPA reports are a chance for parents to get a snapshot of your child's performance during the first 6 weeks of term. The teachers have judged each student against a rubric on 5 (Years 10-12) or 6 (Years 7-9) different areas of assessment.



I have provided an example of a Year 7 GPA report below. What you will notice is the scores on the right give each subject a ranking – as a parent you can see the strengths (Music) and weaknesses (Woodwork/Mathematics).

The figures in the bottom line rank the skills and again you can see the strengths (respectful behaviour) and weakness (submitting work on time). The number in the bottom right hand corner gives your child an average GPA across all subjects and skills.

For a comparison, the average GPA in Term 1 for Year 7 is around 3.5.

JUNIOR SCHOOL NEWS

NAPLAN

Students in Years 7 and 9 will complete NAPLAN Testing on the Wednesday, 15 and Friday, 17 May. The NAPLAN test results provide information on how your child is progressing against national standards. Your child's results will also add to the suite of data our staff currently use to differentiate the curriculum to meet the learning needs of every child. NAPLAN does not replace,



but rather complements, assessments run by your child's teachers throughout the year. NAPLAN also provides the College with data that details the educational growth of each student and the cohort from Year 7 to Year 9. The data is more powerful when there is a high level of participation and effort from each cohort involved. We ask that you encourage your child to participate to the best of their ability.

VAPING AND YOUNG PEOPLE

Electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes, often called 'vapes', are electronic devices designed to deliver vapourised liquids into the lungs. There are many different styles of vapes and types of e-liquids, or e-juices, available. Vapes come in many shapes and sizes and can be made to look like everyday items including highlighters, pens, or USB memory sticks.

The biggest misunderstanding about vapes is that they are harmless compared to cigarettes. This is not true. Vapes are not safe.

VAPING FACTS:

- Many vapes contain nicotine making them very addictive. The nicotine in 1 vape can equal 50 cigarettes.
- Vapes can contain the same harmful chemicals found in cleaning products, nail polish remover, weed killer and bug spray. They just don't put it on the pack.
- Vapes can leave young people at increased risk of depression and anxiety.
- Young people who vape are 3 times more likely to take up smoking cigarettes.
- Vape aerosol is not water vapour.
- Vaping has been linked to serious lung disease.
- Vapes can cause long-lasting negative effects on young people's brain development.

SIGNS YOUR CHILD MIGHT BE VAPING:

Tell-tale signs that your child might have started vaping include the symptoms of nicotine addiction such as feeling irritable or anxious.



STUDENT WELLBEING NEWS

TALK TO YOUR CHILD ABOUT VAPING:

Whether you suspect your child is vaping or not, take the time to talk to them about vaping and help them understand the risks. Try to start the conversation in a relaxed easy-going way, be patient, and remember your goal is to have a conversation, not deliver a lecture. Importantly, have your facts ready.



- Start with information and approach the topic calmly.
- Do not make assumptions and avoid judging or lecturing.
- Focus on health and explain your concerns.
- Decide why they want to quit and write the reasons down or put them in their phone. Remind them to look at the reason(s) when they feel the urge to vape.
- Pick a day to stop vaping. They can put it in their calendar and tell supportive friends and family that they are quitting on that day.
- For some people, chewing sugar-free gum or lollipops can help distract them from the cravings.
- Removing all vaping supplies.
- Download tools (such as apps and texting programs) to their phone that can help with cravings and give encouragement while they are trying to stop vaping.



GENERAL OFFICE NEWS

IMPORTANT INFORMATION – COMPASS EVENTS

The process of using 'Camps, Sports, and Excursion Funds' (CSEF), and credits held on your family accounts, has recently changed. The option previously available in Compass to "use CSEF for an event" will be removed due to this new process.

The new process is as follows:-

The NSC General Office will now automatically allocate credits and CSEF towards events where applicable. Please contact the General Office to notify us if you do not want this automatic allocation towards camps/events to occur for your child/children.

For example:

- An event cost is \$25 and you have a credit or CSEF of \$15, the amount owing for the event will be reduced for your child to \$10, therefore using the credit available to offset the cost of the event
- An event cost is \$25 and you have credit or CSEF greater than \$25, the full amount will be offset against the event and future credits or CSEF will be used in the same way.

Please note that consent **MUST** still be given on Compass for your child to participate in any event.

NAPLAN

National Assessment Program - Literacy and Numeracy Information for parents and carers

- All students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in Australia do NAPLAN tests in March each year.
- NAPLAN tests students' skills in reading, writing and maths.
- The test questions are presented in Standard Australian English dialect.
- Students read some of the questions and listen to others with headphones.
- The tests will get easier or harder, depending on how students are going in the test.
- Students do four different tests. The names of the four tests are:



- Students in Year 3 will do the Writing test using pencil and paper. Year 3 students will answer the other test questions on the computer.
- Students in Years 5, 7 and 9 will answer all their test questions on computers.
- Teachers will help students get ready for NAPLAN tests.
- Schools will get their students' results. The school will then give parents/carers a report showing their own child's results.
- Parents/carers can talk to the teacher about these results.
- NAPLAN shows how students are going all over Australia. People who work in the Australian Government, state and territory education authorities and schools use NAPLAN results. The results let them see which schools are doing well and which schools might need help.
