CAREER NEWS

OPEN DAYS

Open Day season is now complete. Many students were able to visit the Universities that they are considering as a further study destination and came away excited about their prospects for the coming years. If any students were unable to attend these events, many universities offer guided tours in the coming months – see the university websites for details.

VTAC APPLICATIONS

The Victorian Tertiary Admission Centre (VTAC) is the body that manages the university and TAFE application and placement process. If any student wishes to go on to further study (even if they plan to take a gap year) they should apply through VTAC. Year 12 students were taken through the process at a level assembly a couple of weeks ago and several have managed to complete their registration and enter the first draft of their preferences for next year. If any students require assistance, they should avail themselves of the assistance offered by the Norwood Careers Department. The link to the application page is here.

Timely applications close on 28 September 2023. Late applications are possible with an increased fee.

SPECIAL ENTRY ACCESS SCHEME (SEAS)

If any student feels as though they have been disadvantaged by circumstances that are beyond their control and that this has had a detrimental effect on their VCE results, they should take up the opportunity to complete a SEAS application. This gives them the opportunity to explain why they were disadvantaged and may help them receive an offer for a course that may otherwise have overlooked them.

The categories under which an application can be made are:

- 1. General Information
- 2. Financial Hardship
- 3. Disability of Medical Condition
- 4. Difficult Circumstances

Applications close on 6 October at 5pm. There is no opportunity for late submissions.

If a submission is made before 15 September, the application will be reviewed, and feedback given.



There is still a need to remind students about the acceptable wearing of jewellery items. A maximum of two small gold or silver studs or 12 mm sleepers are allowed in each ear. Visible body piercings are not acceptable nor can they be worn with a covering.

On a brighter note, warmer days aren't far away. We would therefore like to extend our usual uniform changeover period from 2 weeks to 4 weeks. Students will have the choice of wearing either the full summer or full winter uniform for the last 2 weeks of Term 3 and the first 2 weeks of Term 4. Families are asked to check hemlines on shorts and dresses to ensure they are still appropriate. New uniform can be purchased at the Uniform Shop. Opening hours are published on the website.

Senior School Update

For this reason, practice exams have been scheduled for the start of the second week in the holidays. This is an important opportunity for students to receive much needed feedback from their teachers on their priority study areas.

RUOK? DAY for 2023 is Thursday, 14 September. It's the national day of action when we remind Australians that every day is the day to ask, 'are you OK?' and start a meaningful conversation whenever they spot the signs that someone, they care about might be struggling with life.

The theme for 2023 is 'Ask R U OK? I'm here to hear'. This comes in response to new research which found four in ten Australians feel asking someone 'are you OK?' is a conversation better had with an expert. However, listening and giving someone your time might be just what they need to help them through a difficult period. The research also found that when authentic, genuine R U OK? conversations are happening, more than 80% of people say they are making a positive difference.

There will be a range of lunchtime activities on Thursday, 14 of September to promote and celebrate the day including an animal farm, a food truck selling hot chips, hot dogs and burgers, an ice-cream van, and guests from Maroondah Youth Services and Youth Dimensions.

STUDENT WELLBEING NEWS

NAVIGATING CHOPPY WATERS: WORKING THROUGH DIFFICULT FRIENDSHIPS

Friendships are an essential part of our lives, providing joy, support, and companionship. However, just like any relationship, friendships can encounter rough patches. If you are facing challenges in a friendship, here are some strategies to help navigate these situations:

- 1. **Communication is Key**: Open and honest communication is the foundation of any healthy relationship. Set aside time to talk with your friend about your concerns, focusing on using "I" statements to express how you feel without placing blame.
- Reflect on Your Feelings: Take time to understand your emotions and why you are feeling the way you do. Sometimes, personal issues can affect how we perceive and react to our friends' behaviour.

However, it is important to recognise when a friendship may no longer be serving your wellbeing and to take steps to protect yourself if needed.


INTERNATIONAL SCIENCE COMPETITION

Students were also able to observe a Port Jackson shark and a grey headed flying fox.


It was an exciting session to have the zoo come to the classroom, students and teachers alike really enjoyed the incursion.














YEAR 12 NEWS





PRODUCTION NEWS




