

WORK EXPERIENCE

YEAR 12 - 2023

Some important things to note for those applying for courses through VTAC:

- VTAC Change of preference for the 1st round of offers has now closed but will re-open between offer rounds for you to make changes if required.
- December round of offers will be made on Thursday, 21 December (2pm).
- January Round (traditionally the main round) will be made on Friday,
 12 January (2pm).
- There are 4 other rounds through January and February (See VTAC Important Dates for specifics).
